Prof. Dr. Giuseppe Grimaldi, of Enna, Italy, was elected president of The International Association of Lions Clubs at the association's 77th International Convention, July 12-15, 1994, in Phoenix, Arizona.

A charter and life member of the Enna Lions Club, with a record of 32 years of perfect attendance, President Grimaldi has served in all positions, from club president to president of the Europa Forum. He served a two-year term as a member of the association's board of directors in 1972-74 and as a board appointee in 1986-87. Prof. Grimaldi is a founding member of the Association of Italian Lions for Diabetes Awareness.

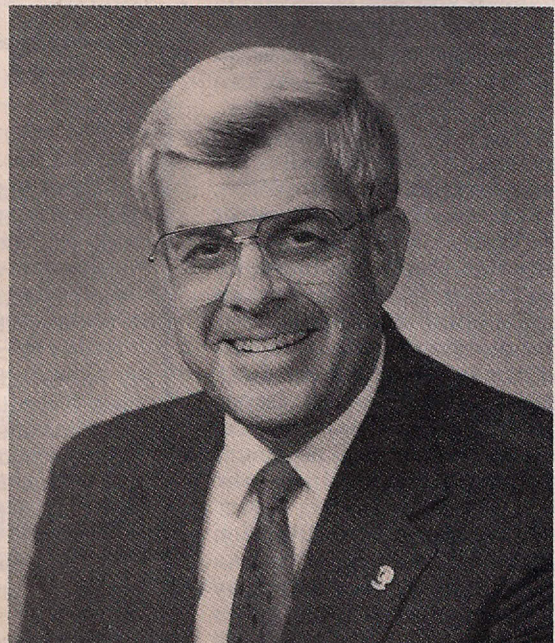
For his many contributions to Lions Clubs International, President Grimaldi has received the 30-Year Charter Chevron, 100% District Governor Award, three Extension awards, the Leadership Award, 19 International President's awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award. He is also a Melvin Jones Fellow.

Prof. Grimaldi is a neuro-psychiatrist, an Emeritus Head Neurologist and former university professor of neurology. He is also the author of many scientific, social and Lion publications.

In addition to his Lion activities, President Grimaldi is a past director of the Italian Medical-Surgical Order and past member of the Medical Court of Justice. He is honorary president of the higher Court of Justice for the preservation of the Mediterranean Sea, a member of the Italian Red Cross and of many international academies. For his humanitarian and civic commitment, he has received awards from UNICEF, UNESCO and the International Red Cross along with the medal of "Grande Ufficiale," one of the highest awards given by the Republic of Italy. Recently, he was honored with the very highest recognition granted by his nation, that of "Knight of Grand Cross of the Order of the Italian Republic." He also was recognized as Man of the Year by receiving the "Premio Garipoli" in Sicily. In addition, he has won various awards for his poetry. He is an honorary citizen of several cities in the United States and is an appreciated speaker throughout the world.

The first Italian to serve as international president, Prof. Grimaldi and his wife, Ariane, have four sons and three grandchildren.

James T. Coffey, of Toronto, Ohio, is the immediate past president of Lions Clubs International. He is a life member of the Toronto Lions Club and served as an international director in 1980-82 and as a 100% district governor.
